Mayor's Report : 2017 to 2018

As I reflect back over the past year I am amazed at how much has been achieved. At the time it can often feel like one is swimming through treacle but, bit by bit, the jigsaw pieces come together and something is actually achieved!

We are soon to move into our new Town Hall offices in Market Place, allowing us to expand our services and we have recently recruited a Town Caretaker, Business Officer



and an apprentice to join us. There are ambitious plans to get this town smartened up and the extra space provided by the new offices will be invaluable. It has been interesting and enjoyable using the building for many charitable and local groups during the time we were arranging for the building work to start and we look forward to more varied and interesting uses of the ground floor as the project unveils.

My promise to the people, as I accepted the role of Mayor, was summed up in Co-operation, Collaboration and Communication and I am pleased to say that I really do think it has worked! I believe the town is, by and large, harmonious and appreciative of the many people's efforts to make it so. I said that there would be no letters to the paper stirring up unrest, and that more could be done over a quiet coffee. Well, I've drunk a heck of a lot of coffee here there and everywhere, but look at the outcomes! We haven't got our bridge yet, but the process is still alive and kicking, we haven't got our Umbrella Centre reopened yet, but again that process is still alive and kicking and the building has been taken off the market. Other Councillors have also been busy moving projects forward, there is a lot happening, believe me.

I also set out to bring together the issues surrounding local development in a public meeting that later became a regular public group with the aim of seeking a community wide view about development around Faversham. I take my hat off to the few that made it through the whole two years; unfortunately many came along, found that it was not all about their issue and then left us to it. It is a shame that much campaigning effort has been made locally in specific areas with no town wide agreement, each area fighting their own corner. What we might have achieved together remains a moot point as it is fair to say we were well behind the curve of having much impact, but I do truly believe we have scored an own goal in losing the ability to put a Western Link to J6 road through to take the pressure off the A2 from the Western Link to Brenley Corner.

However, the group was powerful, as it was seen to represent public opinion in a positive "what can we achieve" way and it shaped the principles of the fortnightly Planning Committee when consulted on new developments and was able to meet with Planners and Developers to hear and be heard. I have been amazed at the persistence and commitment of those that have lasted the two years with me!

Committee Reports

Policy and Finance Committee

The Policy & Finance Committee has continued to focus on the delivery of the Town Business Plan, coordinating the work of all the Council's service committees; working towards the goals of the Five Year Strategic Plan.

The No.12 Market Place project, to create new Council Offices and a Heritage Hub in the heart of the town is progressing as planned. When completed it will accommodate Council staff on the first floor and direct visitors to the town's museums and heritage centres, displaying the municipal regalia and charters. The aim is to widen resident interest in local history and attract more visitors to the town, plus bringing added economic benefits to the Faversham business community and local people.

A town caretaker has been appointed to improve the appearance of streets and public spaces to boost the town's attractiveness. A new business support manager has been recruited to assist the business community since the winding up of the Faversham Business Partnership.

To ensure the Town Council can monitor the performance of new projects, initiatives, festivals and events a comprehensive survey has been undertaken involving the town's business community to measure the strengths and challenges to doing business in the town and benchmarking current footfall in the town centre.

Looking forward, Faversham is facing serious challenges from new development of homes and employment sites and action has begun to build a more proactive approach involving the wider community to inform future house building and Swale Borough Council's Local Planning process.

Throughout the year the Council has revised policies and financial & legal requirements to support national and local demands overseeing

the management of council assets. The Policy & Finance Committee also continues to monitor day to day running costs such as salaries, office expenses together with the management and general administration of the Council's affairs.

Public Realm Group

The group had agreed to organise a walk around the town centre in the week before each meeting to check on problems in parts of the town. These have been very successful and on our recent walks the Town Clerk has taken a number of photographs which has improved our reports to both the Council and for reporting problems to authorities.

Long discussions had been held about parking around the Guildhall and finally the installation of double yellow heritage lines was agreed by JTB as the best option and recently they have been completed. A great improvement from having three lines of cars parked by the Guildhall door to just occasional disabled parking. Many yellow lines have been renewed around the town, although not always with the appropriate heritage style and the group has reported and had these changed.

The working group has tried to install a number of benches around the town and have discussed several places, but there has been substantial opposition to many of the suggested sites. Despite this we now have a new bench in the town centre and a perch bench by the bus-stop at the station, although we still wish to install more.

Concern had been expressed about overhanging of the hedge on Chase House which has now been reduced after discussions with the owner. Also KCC Highways and Blenwoods have undertaken work on verges, identified by the group, and the new owners of Delbridge house were thanked for the extensive work they have completed.

The working group has investigated the security of the town after vehicle attacks in other parts of the country and although the initial proposals are not affordable, we are looking at alternatives.

The working group walkabouts regularly note minor works, and graffiti removal around the town, currently reporting them to the authorities but many could easily be completed by a Town Caretaker and we are looking forward to working with Adam Andrews, a recently retired fireman, who has been appointed to the post.

Community Services Committee

This is the second year of the Community Services Committee and our objective was to engage with and explore the needs and wants of local people. The Local Engagement Forum is a good example of this, it's not just about Faversham but also the surrounding villages that look to the town as their centre, where they shop and use its amenities. There have been some interesting topics on the Local Engagement Forum agendas and engaging discussions concerning them.

With the Keep Faversham Clean campaign 3 litter picks were organised around the town and hopefully more will happen in the following year. 20's Plenty and Speedwatch are well supported.

The allotments fall under the umbrella of the Community Services Committee and have gone from strength to strength, they are a real asset to the town and a good working relationship has formed with the council and the allotment associations and Society. A meeting was held recently with residents of the town concerning St Nicholas Road Allotment site and a working group has now been formed.

A Youth Steering Group has recently been formed and I hope that in the coming years this will evolve into a Youth Council for the town as it is important to engage with the young people.

The quarterly Newsletter has been going for some time and is delivered to all the residents of the town, also the town council surgeries started this year these are held once a quarter at the Guildhall and the next is on Saturday 9th June 2018.

Heritage Committee

12 Market Place is in the process of being transformed. The Town Council Office, on the first floor, will be easily assessable with a lift to enable anyone to visit the Council offices.

Faversham Heritage Hub is an exciting new collaboration bringing Faversham museums together. Incorporating two exhibition areas, reading room and archive storage. At the heart of our town - a place for residents and visitors alike to discover our geography and history; enabling better orientation to the hidden treasures of Faversham. Phase 1, opening Summer 2018, will consist of a number of exhibitions; the first in partnership with Christ Church University.

During 2018 the Town Council will be working on grant applications to the Heritage Lottery Fund to get the Heritage Hub operational and fully equipped. As a result of a very significant fall in ticket sales for the National Lottery the funds available to all distributors of Lottery funds have fallen considerably. Accordingly the competition for funds is intense and the Town Council is working very hard with the Faversham Society and the Town's other Museums and places of interest to put together the best possible bid.
