022. Presentation on Pocket Parks by Evie Curd

Cllr Williams invited Evie Curd, a Year 13 student at Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School to deliver a presentation on her school project, "Pocket Parks".

Evie presented her designs and possible locations were discussed including East Street, Crescent Road, Preston Street, Station Road, Newton Road, Court Street, Central Car Park, and Back Lane. It was suggested outside the Library or Station Road would be ideal locations to concentrate initial plans. It was suggested Evie be invited to future meetings as the project progressed.

It was proposed by Cllr Henderson, seconded by Cllr Williams and on being put to the meeting it was **RESOLVED** to record the **Environment** Committee's support for the project.

025. Minutes and Matters Arising

Cllr Williams proposed, seconded by Martin Hatchwell and on being put to the meeting it was **RESOLVED** to accept the **Minutes** of the **Environment Committee** dated 13th July 2022.

026. Development Updates

Stonebridge Pond – Matthew Hatchwell referred to the notes of the Stonebridge Pond meeting of 17th October 2022.

It was proposed by Cllr Williams, seconded by Cllr Henderson and on being put to the meeting it was **RESOLVED** to set up a Working Group involving relevant stakeholders.

Biodiversity – It was agreed to defer discussions on the Biodiversity Leaflet until the next meeting.

Cllr Williams referred to the paper entitled "Improving Air Quality and Biodiversity in Ospringe". The SBC car park had been identified as an area that could be improved with hedges and 2 trees and planters either side of Ospringe Street. SBC feedback had been positive and KCC would need to be consulted regarding placing a planter under the road sign on the opposite side of Ospringe Street. The planting could be a co-ordinated effort between the Facilities Manager, Facilities Apprentice and the community.

Cllr Williams referred to proposal to set aside £2500 towards the budget for these works. The Assistant to the Town Clerk referred to previously purchased planters and whether they could be used as part of this project. Cllr Williams advised they had been purchased under post-COVID funding for town centres and he would check to see if there were any restrictions on their placement.

It was proposed by Cllr Henderson, seconded by Cllr Williams and on being put to the meeting it was **RESOLVED** to allocate £2500 to this project subject to permission from Swale Borough Council, Kent County Council, and detailed quotes to be presented at the next meeting of 9th November to agree purchases.

Pesticide Free Town – It was agreed to defer discussions until the next meeting.

Community Gardening – Cllr Williams advised there would be further activities in November.

Nutrient Neutrality – Matthew Hatchwell referred to the response to the letter sent by the Town Council to the SBC Leader, Cllr Mike Baldock. It was agreed further work was needed to check the guidance contained before responding to the letter.

Water/Waste Water – Matthew Hatchwell reported on recent water quality testing at Standard Quay and Westbrook.

Martin Hatchwell advised it was important for Councillors to make constituents aware of the level of siltation at Stonebridge Pond. If enough public concern was raised this would help increase pressure to improve the situation. Articles would shortly be appearing in the local media. Cllr Henderson advised he would produce a letter for residents around the

Stonebridge Pond area and the matter could be raised in the Council Newsletter.

027. Air Quality Action Plan (AQAP) 2023-2028 Update

The Air Quality Action Plan was noted.

028. Faversham Lakes Country Park

Cllr Henderson referred to the new country park being open at the Anderson development at Faversham Lakes.

Discussions were ongoing between Anderson, SBC and Kent Wildlife Trust regarding future responsibility for the maintenance at the country park. Cllr Henderson agreed to discuss the matter with SBC.


Pocket Park Plan

- Lots of people have said it's a valid problem



















Inspiration + Cultural and Historical Influence

This design too was inspired by the shipping history, but also from other features like the crest, the telephone boxes seen all over england, traditional faversham bins and plants and holds a woodland theme running throughout. The with the central boat seat was inspired by the shipping industry. But additionally i've included a hop sculpture to symbolize the farming roots of the town, placed on top on a resin cased anvil paying homage to the blacksmiths of medieval faversham. The fretwork crest will turn the brick planter into a landmark and I will continue this brick them throughout the site, using them to line the paths as they respect the brick industry in faversham.





Inspiration + Cultural and Historical Influence

Favershams name is derived from the old english...'homestead of the smith', with the shipyard and port being the main attraction of the village. Within my design will incorporate old steel tool sculptures scattered amongst flowerbeds to symbolise smithery, with a central Sculpture of oast house to symbolise the downs and history of site. All the Wooden borders behind the benches are inspired by an upcycling project i've helped with and i think it will look really beautiful in this space, made from old shipyard wood to honour the history.
