where representatives from other Councils in the county, where volunteer groups, charities and members of the public were invited to discuss what is next in their campaigns to reduce and eliminate pesticide use in their communities.

Hannah and Chris spoke about Faversham Town Council's ambition for Faversham to become a pesticide free town and outlined what action would need to be taken for this to be achieved. This includes getting to know the picture of who is using what chemicals where and for what, reaching out to residents in Faversham and increasing public awareness of the damage that pesticides can cause to the environment and wildlife, and looking at a phased approach to becoming completely pesticide free.

Faversham is officially recognised as working towards becoming pesticide free and the Climate and Biodiversity committee will continue to prioritise chemical reduction as one of its key aims. PUBLIC SPACES UPDATE

The Town Council's Public Spaces Working Group continues to work with partners to improve the public spaces around Faversham.

Benches

Most have now been refurbished, not only within the town centre but on Watling Street, the A2, The Brents, South Road and along the Westbrook working with the Friends of the Westbrook.

More recently a bench has been installed on the London Road for passengers of the new X4 service to Faversham town centre and Canterbury.

Cycle Racks

We followed up on requests for cycle racks in the town with the most recent requests being for the Market Place and for some town centre secure cycle storage. New racks have gone in to the side of the Guildhall, and we successfully applied for a grant from Swale Borough council to trial secure cycle storage in Central and Institute Road car parks. These should be in place soon.

Planters

Working with the Climate and Biodiversity Group, four planters have been located, outside the railway station, on Forbes Road, Stone Street and The Market Place. The group also identified that the trees and raised beds in Queens Hall car park were in a poor state and gained funding support from SBC for much needed improvements. Planting is due to happen in the spring.

Dropped Kerbs

Following requests from wheel chair users extra dropped kerbs are due to be installed within the town centre and some of these are to provide better access to the recently added disabled bays in the Partridge Lane car park.

Water Bottle Refilling Stations

We lobbied Swale Borough Council for a water bottle refill station to be installed both in Central Car Park by the cycle racks and on the Recreation ground by the Outdoor Gym. This links to the Town Councils aim to reduce the use of single use plastic.

Faversham's Coat of Arms Signs

These four signs are currently undergoing refurbishment and should be back in place later this year. Faversham is the only town in the United Kingdom permitted to use the Royal Arms of England, unchanged, as its own Coat of Arms. These four heraldic signs are a welcome to all visitors to our historic town of Faversham.

LCWIP UPDATE

Faversham's Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) was signed off by Town Councillors in February.

The Plan includes over fifty proposals for making it easier for pedestrians to cross local streets and for slowing traffic so bike users can get around more safely. It has been put together using the feedback the public gave us through the community engagement website Commonplace, when the 20mph scheme launched.

Faversham is only the second town in Kent to have its own town level LCWIP and we are hoping that it will put us near the front of the queue when it comes to funding from central government, Kent County Council and Swale Borough Council.

The plan is designed to be updated regularly and during the next six months we will be asking the public for their views on how it can be improved as well as developing proposals for making it easier to walk and cycle into the town from neighbouring villages.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

Faversham Town Council marked Holocaust Memorial Day (27nd Jan) with an exhibition in the Town Hall that was open for three days.

The exhibition included 24 panels of information about the horror of the Holocaust as well as subsequent acts of genocide across the world. Video material brought the stories to life. We showed 30 minutes of footage which includes the powerful, personal recollections of survivors of the Holocaust and more recent atrocities. All of the words and pictures were supplied by the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust, an international charity.

Among the information panel was the '10 stages of genocide' which set out the pattern of events, in examples across the world, that lead to genocide. As the Trust puts it, 'genocide never just happens'. It starts with division of 'them' and ;us', discrimination and dehumanisation. Persecution, extermination and denial come later. Many visitors commented on what a reminder this is to guard against intolerance or hatred that we encounter sometimes in our society even today.

Thank you to every who attended the exhibition, which received several hundred visitors. As well as Faversham residents, people came from Whitstable, Canterbury, Dartford, among other places to see it, helped by mention on the ITV local news.

A great many of us have a connection through our families to the Holocaust or the terrible events of the 1930s and 1940s. Local people who came to the exhibition took the opportunity to share with councillors their or their relatives' experiences of those dark days.

I must thank the Town Council's Apprentice Abi Rainbow-Williams who gave me essential help to create the exhibition and fellow Town Councillors who manned the exhibition over the three days. FAVERSHAM LEADING THE WAY WITH LIVING BUS SHELTERS!

Faversham Town Council have been working hard on improving biodiversity in Faversham and proactively working with other organisations and the community to find new projects to benefit both wildlife and people's lives.

The Climate and Biodiversity Working Group allocated funding to replace two bus shelters in the town centre with new ones to include a living roof. These shelters have been widely used in mainland Europe and is a beneficial way of increasing opportunities for biodiversity, help tackle poor air quality and improve the amenity value of our community.

The two locations, The Mall and Stone Street, are both on busy roads, where bus use is higher. There are plans to look at turning other bus shelters in the town into ones with living roofs in the future. The plants are drought tolerant

species which have nectar rich flowers for pollinators. They are low maintenance requiring very little watering and weeding, throughout the year, making it really cost effective.

Green or living roofs on top of structures such as bus shelters, allow us to find ways to help nature and aid biodiversity to flourish in areas that would be difficult to otherwise do. It is increasingly clear that urban areas have a very important part of conservation of species, and Faversham has shown that we can not only can this be achieved but also, we can lead the way. Faversham Town Council have put the Climate and Biodiversity emergency as a priority since 2019 and continue to work to improve both our natural world but people's lives too.





OPEN LETTER

Larissa Read Chief Executive Officer Swale Borough Council

Dear Larissa

TS Hazard is a building vital to the history of Faversham. Built in 1429 it has stood on the bank of Faversham Creek for nearly 600 years and been part of the commercial life of the Town ever since.

Faversham Town Council asks that Swale Borough Council takes active responsibility for the serious and immediate "at risk" situation of the building. TS Hazard came into the ownership of Swale Borough Council in 1974, almost 50 years ago and was for many years in active use by the local Sea Cadets. In recent years they have been forced to leave entirely due to the seriously poor condition of the building.

Swale Borough Council, as the planning authority, has a clear responsibility for the condition of this 2* listed building as it has for all listed buildings at risk. More to the point it is directly responsible as owner for the building and its condition. As the Town Council understands the crucial and urgent problem right now is the roof. This is badly damaged, leaking and in danger of collapse if a further storm occurs, or indeed with any bad weather. In the only slightly longer term the timber frame and walls are in poor order and the frequent flooding is certain to be damaging the foundations.

Faversham Town Council formally requests Swale Borough Council:

- 1. Immediately to have a thorough survey of TS Hazard conducted by a surveyor with expertise in timber framed ancient buildings to ascertain what work is required so that the building is no longer in any way at risk. Thereafter promptly to do all necessary works identified.
- 2. To consult meaningfully and quickly with local organisations in Faversham, including, but not restricted to the Town Council and the Faversham Society, with a clear objective of finding a secure and financially viable future for TS Hazard. It is clear that in the last 20 years there has been little or no maintenance carried out on the building.

This issue has gone on for too long. It must be solved and the responsibility clearly lies in the hands of Swale Borough Council. We therefore look forward to discussing your plans as a matter of urgency and reaching an agreed and speedy solution.
