The 1972 Local Government Act saw some of the largest changes to local government since 1894.

The number of you volunteering in so many ways that help that community spirit never ceases to make me smile. It is quite humbling to represent you in the mayoral role and get a chance to say thank you.



To kick off the project a talk was held in the Guildhall during Men's Mental Health Month in November where Alex Richardson from Keep Talking Services spoke to a large group about "Mental Health, Men's Mental Health, and Loneliness" this talk allowed the town council to bring a number or organisations and residents together to have an open and frank conversation about mental health and how we support residents to reach out.

One of the organisations that has become involved in the project are the Abbey Physic Community Garden and their Men's Shed. Men's Sheds are similar to garden sheds – a place to pursue practical interests at leisure and to practice skills. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature while Men's Sheds are the opposite. They're about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter. Abbey Physics Men's shed runs a regular coffee morning anyone interested to get involved should contact the physic garden to find out the dates of the next coffee morning.

Cross Town Walking Route Takes Shape

The Town Council organised a well supported exhibition in the Town Hall on the plans for the Cross Town Walking Route (XTWR) project at the end of last year, which ran for three weeks.

The XTWR project is being delivered by Kent County Council Highways and funded by Active Travel England and will involve building a set of physical improvements to local streets, junctions and pavements along a route from Lower Road through to Faversham Rec. It aims to make it easier for pedestrians and wheel chair users to move around and to encourage residents and visitors to make journeys on foot.





The exhibition objectives were to make the public more aware of the scheme and what it involves and to gather feedback from residents which could be used to enhance the outline designs on display. The exhibition allowed the public to view the detailed designs for each of the interventions and also look at a number of computer generated visualisations of how some of the most significant interventions will look once they are completed.

Over 300 people visited the exhibition and 116 residents gave us feedback, either while they were visiting or by email later. Overall, the feedback was positive, although there were concerns expressed about the overall costs of the scheme which some considered to be high, even if the funding is coming from central government rather than local councils.

In terms of specific interventions both the new zebra crossings on Newton Road and South Road were broadly welcomed as were the improvements at the junction of Lower Road and South Road and the planned work at St Marys Road. Amongst the concerns were whether pedestrians would have sufficient right of way at the Bank Street informal crossing, some of the detail of the crossing design at the Napleton Road/ South Road junction and the effectiveness of the Lower Road interventions in slowing traffic.

All residents responses have been fed back to Kent Highways who are currently finaliisng their plans for the scheme. The Town Council was a partner in the development of the project bid alongside KCC and Swale Borough Council and we have continued to argue for a scheme which draws on feedback from residents, has the maximum impact in slowing traffic and helping pedestrians and which provides real value to the public, during the process of detailed plans being prepared.

Action Against Graffiti

In December, Faversham Town Council's Environment Committee agreed its graffiti policy and action plan. The Town Council itself does not have a duty to remove graffiti, that lays with Swale Borough Council, but residents expect the town council to take the lead in fighting to reduce levels of graffiti within the town.

The first thing any resident can do is to report graffiti to the right place.

If the problem is on public property and or offensive you should contact the Borough Council. You can do this through their online portal: https://swale.gov.uk/bins-littering-and-the-

environment/littering/report-graffiti.

The town council is also in discussions with Swale Borough Council about the potential of borrowing their graffiti buster machine and looking to engage with local businesses and schools and local community groups to encourage everyone to work pro-actively together to tackle the problem.

Alongside the action plan councillors have worked with stakeholders to look at art projects on private buildings and communication boxes to look to turn graffiti problem areas into art assets that benefit the town.

The Environment Committee will continue work on the action plans recommendations and as a community it is hoped that we can all work together to make a real difference in tackling levels of graffiti all across Faversham.



Potholes pose significant risks, damaging vehicles and endangering pedestrians. Reporting potholes to Kent County Council is crucial. Residents' reports help prioritise repairs and enhance overall road safety.

The more potholes that are reported, the more repairs can be made across Faversham. Each report guides Kent County Council in resource allocation, ensuring timely fixes. KCC have a target of 28 days to repair potholes once reported. If we stop reporting potholes in Faversham, KCC resources will be directed to repairing potholes in other areas of Kent.

Active resident participation is vital for an efficient and safe road network. By promptly reporting potholes, we collectively contribute to maintaining Faversham's roads. Let's take pride in our community, working together to report potholes and aid Kent County Council in creating safer roads.
