The Guildhall Clock, is in Urgent Need of Repairs

When walking though Market Place do you glance at the Clock on the Guildhall?

'I was surprised how many times I see people look and how often I do' said Cllr Trevor Martin

You may have noticed it is not as accurate as it was, the years have taken their toll and although the clock has been looked after it has not had a major service that anyone can remember.

The Clock mechanism is labelled as Francis Crow Faversham 1814 though it is thought by experts to be the work of the highly regarded turret clock manufacturer, Thwaites of Clerkenwell. In itself a significant historical asset in the town.

The Town Council has approved a restoration program to revive both the clock's functionality and its hourly striking bell, which hasn't rung for years.

The Clock will be taken and fully serviced, whilst undertaking the service and repair an automatic winder will be added and the bell mechanism fitted with a night time silencing system.



This will ensure the clock remains operational for another 50 years, maintaining its role as both a practical timekeeper and a cherished historical artifact.

Perry Court

The Perry Court Allotments and green space, including a community orchard, was transferred late last year from the management



company to Faversham Town Council.

This was a significant move for the town council and the transfer of the green space marks a new chapter for the council. There is a lot of work to be done on the site, including planting new hedging, trees, bulb planting etc. Also, it would be wonderful if we could increase the size of the Community Orchard. We want to encourage biodiversity and also use the space for community events.

The people on the allotment waiting list have been notified and I would like to thank you for your patience. The council's facilities team have been working very hard getting the allotment site divided up into plots, increasing the size of the allotments etc. There has also been a container delivered for storage and there is also a water supply.

As Chair of the Environment Committee, I am delighted to welcome the Perry Court Allotment holders into the fold of the Faversham Town Council and the transfer reflects our commitment to supporting our local green spaces and also promoting sustainable living by residents being able to grow their own fruit and veg.

Faversham is incredibly lucky to have a number of allotment sites in the town, which are all very different and special in their own unique way.

Faversham Healthy Futures Project

It is sometime since we last updated you on the project. You may recall we held an exhibition in the gallery at the Town Hall, Market Place in May 2023. You can see the report on the Town Council website https://favershamtowncouncil.gov.uk/directory/faversham-healthy-futures/. The report was circulated to various departments within the Integrated Care Board, Kent and Medway NHS. The response was favourable and we have had a number of meetings with them to discuss the way forward.

Last July we were invited by the Faversham Society to give one of a series of 4 "Live Talks". This was well attended and we received many good ideas and positive feedback. Again, the report is on the Faversham Town Council website.

In October 2024, we presented the project at a symposium organised by Kent and Medway Integrated Care Board. The theme for the symposium was 'Prevention' and as well as presenting our project we were able to challenge the attendees to come up with ideas on how to prevent childhood obesity. This is an increasing and serious problem throughout the UK which can lead to life-long and life-threatening conditions. Again, the report is on the Faversham Town Council website.

Our next intended step is to hold another open meeting but cannot do this until we receive some relevant information from the local NHS. Those of you who have registered an interest in the project will be emailed with details of the meeting. If you haven't registered but would like to be included please send your name and email address to **fhf@favershamtowncouncil.gov.uk**.

Since starting this project, and as we all know, there has been a change of government and their proposals have slightly affected the direction of the project. However, we continue to collaborate



with the Centre for Health Service Studies (CHSS) at Kent University and to meet with senior members of the Integrated Care Board for Kent and Medway. We hope to be able to give a progress report in the next FTC Newsletter.

Cross Town Walking Route Takes Shape

Kent County Council's contractors
have made significant progress on the
implementation of the Faversham
East West Cross Town Walking route,
the major Active Travel England
funded project which Kent County
Council, the local highway authority,
made a successful bid for in 2023,
with support from the Town Council.



At the end of last year, a small group of town councillors and council staff were treated to an informal walk through of the work that has been done so far. The visit gave an opportunity to review its impact of the work and raise outstanding residents' concerns.

From what we saw it was clear that the work carried out along Lower Road- introducing informal crossing points and speed cushions, widening pavements, narrowing junctions and properly marking bus stops has slowed traffic and created a far more pedestrian friendly environment. It was also exciting to see the new zebra crossing on South Road, which I know many residents have been looking forward to, and which is already contributing to an easier journey for pedestrians and those with assisted mobility needs who want to cross here.

While the road works required to implement the project have caused some disruption, now that some of the interventions have been completed, I hope most residents will agree that they are resulting in a safer environment for pedestrians, assisted mobility users and cyclists, while having very little impact on vehicle users who drive to the speed limit.


The Town Council supported the Cross Town Walking Route bid because we are committed to making our streets safer and more enjoyable for pedestrians. We also want to encourage compliance with the town wide 20mph scheme which residents gave overwhelming support to in a public

consultation back in 2021. Lower Road was one of the few roads in Faversham where KCC remained concerned about vehicle speeds, so it has been good to see work going on to reduce speeds.



The overall scheme is a set of highways improvements aimed at making it easier for pedestrians and those with assisted mobility needs to travel safely across Faversham. The route runs from the junction of Lower Road with Wallers Road, along Lower Road, South Road, Cross Lane, Gatefield Lane and William Street to the entrance of Faversham Recreation Ground. It involves pavement widening, road junction narrowing, new zebra crossings, informal crossing points and traffic calming measures like speed cushions. Work is due to be completed during the first six months of 2025.

Kent's contractors have now moved onto the interventions which will improve safety at the road junctions between Newton Road the Recreation Ground. As Town Councillors we are hoping that the introduction of new crossing points on Newton Road as part of this stage of the project, including one near the entrance to Solomons Lane, will have a particularly positive impact on vehicle speeds and pedestrian safety on another road where residents have been concerned about non-compliance with the 20mph speed limit.



Faversham's Water Quality

Faversham Creek is a precious amenity in the heart of the town, the source of our maritime heritage as a royal port, a great place to go for locals and visitors and it is horribly polluted.

Faversham and Villages Water Quality Testing

– FAVWAT- a group of citizen scientist

volunteers have been investigating the state

of the creek and local waterways for 3 years

now. Since June 2024 they have been testing

for E.coli from human and animal waste.

Some E.coli is toxic to humans, so coastal bathing water quality is classified as 'poor' when levels reach 500 cfu/100ml. The Olympic triathlon swim was postponed last year when the Seine measured 1,000 cfu.

FAVWAT have found levels of E.coli greater than 10,000 cfu at Town Quay every month they have tested at high tide since last June. Tests done lower down the Creek on the rising tide show that nearly all the pollution comes from the sewage works and up.

Yes, there is a sewage works.









It pumps up to 7 million litres of partially treated sewage into the Creek every day. This is added to by regular storm sewer overflows of untreated sewage.

There are other possible sources of E.coli: from the residential boats on the creek; from





run off from the fields from cattle and manure spreading. More detailed testing would be needed to isolate these.

E. Coli aren't the only problem. Nitrates and phosphates from the sewage works, which does not treat specifically for these, and from fertilizer run off from the fields are also a threat. This is not to humans but to the ecology of the creek and the Swale Estuary. These are nutrients that can lead to oxygen starvation and mats of algae that suppress other life forms. **FAVWAT** tested the outflow of the sewage works over a year and found levels of nitrates and phosphates that would pose a threat to a sensitive environment.

Faversham Town Council have now formed a Water

Quality Working Group to include **FAVWAT**. This brings together the interests of various groups using

Faversham Creek, freshwater courses and water bodies as amenities for the benefit of all.

FAVWAT are supported by the Faversham Creek Trust, they are working with the Friends of the Westbrook and Stonebridge Ponds to investigate water quality in the chalk streams and waterways feeding into the Creek and are also engaged with the Zoological Society of London and their project "Restoring the Thamescape" with the particular ambition to restore seagrass meadows. Favwat are planning more detailed testing with training from The Environment Agency.

GP Practice Patient Survey Results Unveiled


Faversham is home to two GP practices, Newton Place Surgery and Faversham Medical Practice, both of which have active Patient Participation Groups (PPGs). Towards the end of last year, the PPGs teamed up to conduct a survey, asking patients about their experiences. Over 200 patients took part.



The results show that patients generally appreciate the surgeries' friendly, kind and professional staff. Out of a maximum rating of 5, 59% of participants rated their own practice between 4 and 5. Many respondents expressed an understanding of the extra demands on their practices due to new housing developments in the area.

Despite the positive feedback, the survey highlighted several areas for improvement. One major issue was the difficulty in getting GP appointments, often resulting in longer waits or a scramble to secure an appointment on the day. Patients from both practices suggested revisiting the appointment systems to make the process easier, fairer and less time-consuming.

There was also concern about the difficulty of getting appointments with a named GP, especially among older residents and those with ongoing health issues. Three other areas were also identified: a lack of focus on providing regular health checks and monitoring: a sense of inconsistent communications back from the practices when a health issue is either ongoing or needing a referral; and the very varying usage and views on the online platform, E-Consult.



An important takeaway from the survey was the immense value patients place on the Urgent Treatment Centre, recognising its support for both the town and the GP practices.

The two PPGs are sharing the results with the practices with the aim of further bolstering the wellbeing of Faversham residents and a further progress update will be in the next newsletter.

Discover Faversham's Nocturnal Wildlife with Our Bat Detectors!

Bats hunt for insects at night, using a high frequency system calledecholocation. Bat calls are usually pitched at too high a frequency for humans to hear naturally, but they can be heard or recorded using a bat detector. Individual bat species emit calls with specific characteristics related to their size, flight behaviour, environment and prey types. This means that with the aid of bat detectors we can identify many species by listening to their calls or recording them for sound analysis on a computer.

Faversham Town Council now has 12 Magenta Bat 5 Bat Detectors for loan to groups and


individuals. The detector converts high frequency ultrasound to lower sounds, which can be heard via the built in loud speaker. To book the bat detectors, please call Rob on:


