4. Use the opportunities provided by the events programme to raise the profile of the town as a visitor destination and boost the local economy.
5. Support and promote direct community volunteer involvement with local events and community endeavours including local businesses and community groups as well as with individuals.
6. Encourage young people to take an active interest in their community and get involved in local democracy.
7. To administer the policy to administer the youth funding.
8. Ensure the Council meets its duties in relation to crime & disorder.
9. Continue to promote the Faversham and District Lottery for the benefit of the local good causes.
10. Work in partnership with the Faversham Community Networking Group.
11. To liaise with and support others in the provision and promotion of sports and physical activities and SBC's Empowering You in Swale Strategy and SBC's Pitch Strategy.

Appendix C

Motion: Sharps Bin Collection Charges

This Council notes that Swale Borough Council has introduced a charging structure for sharps bin collections, with each household receiving two free collections per year between 1 April and 31 March, and additional collections charged at £3.80 per collection.

This Council further notes the important role safe sharps disposal plays in protecting public health and supporting residents managing chronic health conditions, including Type 1 diabetes and other conditions requiring regular use of needles or medical sharps.

While recognising the significant financial pressures facing local authorities and the need to balance budgets, this Council is concerned about the potential impact these changes may have on vulnerable residents and those requiring more frequent collections due to medical need.

Therefore, Faversham Town Council resolves to:

1. Write to Swale Borough Council seeking clarification on:
 - The full details of the new charging arrangements;
 - Any exemptions, concessions, or support available for residents with chronic or lifelong medical conditions;
 - Any equality or impact assessments undertaken regarding the changes;
 - The anticipated impact on residents across Swale, including Faversham.
2. Request that Swale Borough Council keeps the policy under review to ensure residents with genuine medical needs are not unfairly disadvantaged.
3. Ask that the response from Swale Borough Council be shared with all councillors and, where appropriate, communicated to residents.

Appendix D

TOWN OF SANCTUARY Strategy & Action Plan (2026–2029)

1. Introduction

Faversham has a long and rich history shaped by movement, trade, and cultural exchange. Today, that legacy continues as the town responds to the needs of people seeking sanctuary from conflict, persecution, and insecurity.

Faversham Town Council is proud to present this Town of Sanctuary Strategy & Action Plan (2026–2029), reaffirming its commitment to building a welcoming, inclusive, and compassionate community. This strategy aligns with the national City of Sanctuary movement and reflects our belief that everyone, regardless of origin, should feel safe, valued, and able to contribute.

In recent years, Faversham has taken meaningful steps to support refugees and asylum seekers through partnerships with local organisations, community groups, and volunteers. However, this work has not been without challenge. Rising anti-migration sentiment and organised campaigns have at times created division and misinformation within the community.

This strategy acknowledges both realities:

- the strength and solidarity shown by many residents
- and the need to respond thoughtfully to tension and opposition

Our goal is to ensure Faversham continues to grow as a place where welcome is stronger than fear, and where community cohesion is actively nurtured.

2. Purpose & Background

Faversham Town Council formally commits to supporting the City of Sanctuary vision, recognising that:

- The UK should be a place of safety for those fleeing violence and persecution
- Refugees and asylum seekers bring skills, resilience, and cultural richness
- A coordinated, community-led approach is essential for successful integration

This strategy builds on:

- Existing local support networks and voluntary action
- Collaboration with charities, faith groups, and residents
- Experience gained through supporting displaced people in Kent

At the same time, the Council recognises the challenging context in which this work takes place. National and local anti-migration campaigns have:

- Increased misinformation about asylum processes
- Created anxiety within parts of the community
- Placed pressure on local authorities and services

In response, this strategy emphasises transparency, education, and dialogue, alongside practical support.

3. Principles

Faversham Town Council's approach is guided by the following principles:

3.1 Welcome and Inclusion

We promote a culture where people seeking sanctuary are treated with dignity, respect, and kindness.

3.2 Community Cohesion

We recognise that integration is a two-way process, requiring engagement between new arrivals and existing residents.

3.3 Evidence-Based Communication

We commit to using accurate, responsible language and actively countering misinformation.

3.4 Partnership Working

Where appropriate and within the remit of the Council we will collaborate with:

- Local charities and voluntary groups
- Schools and faith organisations
- Health and social services

3.5 Resilience in the Face of Opposition

We acknowledge the presence of anti-migration sentiment and commit to:

- Responding constructively, not reactively
- Supporting open, respectful dialogue
- Protect vulnerable individuals from hostility
- Work constructively with the police where there is a need to

4. Our Priorities and Aims

Priority 1: Reducing Hardship

- Provide access to local grant funding where appropriate
- Signpost refugees and asylum seekers to support services if we encounter them through casework or an approach to the Council
- Work with partners to address housing, food security, and basic needs provision

Priority 2: Education and Awareness

- Support schools in delivering education about migration and sanctuary
- Promote public awareness through events and workshops
- Share accurate information about asylum and refugee processes
- Support the work of Faversham and Villages Refugee solidarity group and Kent Refugee action network alongside the work of large national organisations that campaign for humane treatment and dignity for displaced people.

Priority 3: Strengthening Community Relationships

- Facilitate cultural and social events that bring communities together
- Support Refugee Week and similar initiatives
- Encourage participation in local festivals and activities

Priority 4: Access to Facilities and Services

- Offer council spaces for community and refugee-led activities
- Promote access to wellbeing opportunities
- Ensure inclusive access to town services

Priority 5: Empowerment and Participation

- Involve refugees and asylum seeker voices in local decision-making where possible
- Support skills development and volunteering opportunities
- Encourage pathways into employment and community leadership

5. Addressing Challenges and Anti-Migration Sentiment

Faversham Town Council recognises that its work exists within a broader social and political environment where migration is often contested.

Key Challenges Identified:

- Misinformation and negative narratives
- Public concern about local services and resources
- Occasional but significant hostility toward asylum accommodation or support initiatives and Councillors and staff that are thought to be supportive.

Our Response:

5.1 Open Communication

- Provide clear, factual information about local initiatives
- Explain the role and limits of the Town Council
- Share positive stories of contribution and integration

5.2 Community Dialogue

- Create safe spaces for discussion and questions
- Engage respectfully with differing views
- Work to reduce fear through understanding

5.3 Supporting Cohesion

- Promote shared community identity

- Highlight common values and experiences
- Encourage neighbour-to-neighbour engagement

5.4 Protecting Inclusivity

- Uphold zero tolerance for hate, racism or discrimination
- Support those affected by hostility
- Work with partners to ensure safeguarding

6. Consultation and Partnership

This strategy will be delivered in collaboration with:

- Local refugee support organisations
- Voluntary and community groups
- Faith organisations
- Residents and people with lived experience of seeking sanctuary

We will:

- Improve consultation with refugees and asylum seekers
- Strengthen coordination between service providers
- Hold regular partnership meetings

7. A Coordinated Community Response

Faversham Town Council aims to act as a connector and facilitator, ensuring that:

- Support services are better coordinated
- Community efforts are visible and aligned
- Residents understand how they can contribute

We will:

- Share best practice from other towns through attendance of the City of sanctuary local authority network
- Encourage volunteering and civic participation
- Support both general and specialist services

8. Conclusion

Faversham Town Council is committed to building a town that is:

- **Welcoming** to those seeking safety
- **Resilient** in the face of division
- **Confident** in its values of inclusion and fairness

We recognise that this work requires ongoing effort, particularly in a climate where migration is often politicised. However, by working together with honesty, compassion, and determination, Faversham can continue to be a place where everyone has the opportunity to belong and thrive.

Appendix E

Community Projects Report – Fiona Palmer

June 2026

Age Friendly Faversham (incl. Dementia, Loneliness)

The community survey closed on 15th May, and I have been collating the information, ready to present at the next Age Friendly meeting on 22nd June. We will put together an action plan at the meeting or continue in a longer workshop session.

I attended an online meeting with Bernadette McNally from KCC who is supporting us with the project, and she invited Greenwich University to join us. The University of Greenwich are going to be conducting an evaluation process to see how well we are progressing. We are currently due to have ours in Phase 2 of the project, around Nov 26 – Mar 27. They will look at a variety of areas. More details will follow.

Involve Kent are developing a volunteer Ambassador Programme to recruit DBS checked people that can support older residents with issues they might have. We are awaiting further details about how this will work.

One of the ideas is that we should collate events/ activities that happen in Faversham for over 55's. The group would like to share these in the FTC Newsletter as this is posted through doors in town and reaches a lot of people.

Would you be willing to allocate a few pages to advertise events/ activities for over 55's?

Could we also advertise the Community Digital Hub dates, as this reaches non-internet users?

The next meeting is on 22nd June at The Guildhall.

Armed Forces in Faversham

Our application for the Silver Award for the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme was approved, so this will be publicised on our website and social media. Cllr Charles Gibson, our Armed Forces Champion will be attending the Awards Ceremony in Portsmouth in July.

We have been awarded a grant of £650 from the 'Armed Forces Grant Team' to help with some eligible costs for the 'Faversham in the 40's Celebrates Armed Forces Day' event. After the event we will collate the costs and send them to be reviewed before receiving the money.

Actions going forward are for councillors are to ratify the 'Armed Forces and Reservist Employment Policy' and the 'Faversham Town Council Handbook'.

Further actions are to maintain the promotion of the Armed Forces in Faversham through our town events and sharing information about what different groups are doing on our website and social media.

Digital Inclusion in Faversham

I have been in contact with KCC's Digital Kent Team who are going to help us set up some Community Hubs. So far, only Faversham Umbrella would like to be involved. If no other venues come forward, we may set up a Community Hub at 12 Market Place, to be held once every other month.

The Digital Kent Team are recruiting volunteer Digital Champions that will come to the Community Hubs and work 1:1 with members of the public to help with digital training or issues they might have.

Faversham Community Networking Group (FCNG)

I have been collating entries for the next z-fold brochure to go out to venues around the town. This is designed by Claire Windridge. This will be funded by FTC, as previously agreed: £1,630.00 for 5000 copies. FTC will be invoiced for a 30-day payment.

There will be a 'Chatty Bench' outside 12 Market Place for Loneliness Week 15th-21st June. This will be manned by volunteers made up of different FCNG members. They will engage members of the public in chat and offer support and/or leaflets about places they can receive help. We will give out copies of the z-fold too.

I organised a mayoral presentation on 6th June to give out volunteer badges to many groups. We have given out all 1000 badges ordered.

I have started collecting information for the next Family Food Map, ready to go out for the summer holiday. This is designed by Lavinia at Umbrella.

Ongoing work is to find new presenters for the meetings and to organise venues whilst the Guildhall is out of use. I also pass on any information that is sent in, to other members via email and update the Facebook page.

The next meeting is on 3rd July at The Guildhall.

Appendix F

Faversham Festival of Transport 2026

Claire Elliott

The Festival of Transport 2026 was a successful and well-attended event, with positive feedback received from visitors, exhibitors, volunteers and partners. Saturday attendance was notably stronger than in previous years, and the Park & Ride service experienced particularly high usage, indicating continued growth in the event's popularity.

In light of increasing attendance, future planning may need to consider additional capacity or a second venue. One area identified for improvement was the pedestrian crossing point in the town centre, which became congested during the weekend; marshalling this location at future events may help maintain safe pedestrian and traffic flow.

Medical cover and event communications were effective throughout the weekend, and incidents were handled promptly and professionally. A minor operational issue affecting transport services was resolved quickly, minimising disruption.

Sunday setup and vehicle arrivals ran smoothly overall. A complaint was received regarding the positioning of the event ambulance in Market Place; the vehicle was subsequently repositioned as far as operationally possible while maintaining appropriate emergency access.

There were also isolated issues involving a small number of participants and exhibitors seeking to leave before the agreed departure time. These matters were managed on the day, and follow-up communication with relevant representatives is planned in advance of future events.

Public and exhibitor feedback was overwhelmingly positive. One concern was raised regarding the temporary relocation of the motorcycle display this year; this has been reviewed, and the display is expected to return to its usual location for the 2027 event. Additional attractions were highly successful, particularly those that increased visitor interest in the Market Place area. There is clear scope to build on these features in future years.

The event may be approaching a significant anniversary next year, which presents a valuable opportunity to develop the programme further and enhance the visitor experience. Planning will continue with this in mind.
